COMPLAINT-HANDLING PROCEDURE St Peter's College

1.0 INTRODUCTION

St Peter's College Cranbourne ("St Peter's College") is committed to building a school community that features positive and respectful relationships. Within our school, relationships are founded in the gospel values of justice, compassion, reconciliation and kindness. Such relationships support the learning and development of students and value the innate dignity of each person. It is important that each member of the community, including staff, parents, guardians, carers and students, are contributors to the building of the school community. A timely and professional response to complaints is an effective means of encouraging communication, building trust and resolving issues for the betterment of all concerned.

St Peter's College understands that from time to time complaints arise and that it is important that all members of the community have the opportunity to be heard. The College commits to ensuring procedural fairness is observed when dealing with complaints and grievances.

2.0 PURPOSE

All schools managed and operated by the Diocese of Sale Catholic Education Limited (DOSCEL) are required to develop, maintain, and publicise a fair, effective and efficient complaint-handling process, so that complaints about events or decisions at the school can be addressed.

The purpose of this procedure is to:

- provide an outline of the complaints process at St Peter's College so that students, parents, guardians, carers and members of the community are informed of how they can raise complaints or concerns about issues arising at our school.
- ensure that all complaints and concerns regarding St Peter's College are managed in a timely, effective, fair and respectful manner and in accordance with the [DOCSEL COMPLAINTS AND GRIEVANCES MANAGEMENT POLICY](#)

3.0 SCOPE

This procedure relates to complaints brought by students, parents, guardians, carers, or members of our school community and applies to all matters relating to our school. Complaints, concerns or reports relating to suspected child abuse will be managed in accordance with the following DOSCEL policies and procedures:

- Protection of Children – Reporting Obligations Procedure
- Protection of Children – Anti-Grooming Policy

- Protection of Children – Failure to Disclose Policy
- Protection of Children – Failure to Protect Policy
- Mandatory Reporting Policy
- Guide to Reporting Conduct under the Reportable Conduct Scheme
- Child and Family Violence Information Sharing Schemes Policy and Procedure.

4.0 DEFINITIONS

For the purpose of this Policy the following terms are defined as follows:

Parent / Caregiver: a parent or caregiver includes:

- a person who has parental responsibility for ‘major long-term issues’ as defined in the Family Law Act 1975 (Cth)
- a person appointed as ‘guardian’ pursuant to the Children, Youth and Families Act 2005 (Vic.)
- an informal carer with whom the child normally or regularly resides and who has day to-day care and control of the child
- a mature minor student
- an adult student.

Complaint: a complaint means an expression of dissatisfaction with an action taken, decision made or service provided, or the failure to provide a service, take action or make a decision at a school.

Resolved Complaint: a complaint is considered to be resolved when the complainant and/or DOSCEL and/or the school agree on an appropriate response or remedy.

Finalised Complaint: a complaint is considered to be finalised when the Chief Executive Officer, DOSCEL, or delegate of the Chief Executive Officer has made a final determination on the matter after exhausting the processes set out in this Policy.

Unresolved Complaint: a complaint is considered to be unresolved when agreement cannot be reached on a course of action and/or a remedy, or if the remedy cannot be implemented.

5.0 PROCEDURES

St Peter’s College welcomes feedback, both positive and negative, and is committed to continuous improvement. We value open communication with our families and are committed to understanding complaints and addressing them appropriately. We recognise that the complaints process provides an important opportunity for reflection and learning.

We value and encourage open and positive relationships with our school community. We understand that it is in the best interests of students for there to be a trusting relationship between families and our school.

When addressing a complaint, it is expected that all parties will:

- be considerate of each other’s views and respect each other’s role
- be focused on resolution of the complaint, with the interests of the student involved at the centre
- act in good faith and cooperation
- behave with respect and courtesy
- respect the privacy and confidentiality of those involved, as appropriate
- operate within and seek reasonable resolutions that comply with any applicable legislation and DOSCEL policy.
- recognise that schools and DOSCEL may be subject to legal constraints on their ability to act or disclose information in some circumstances.

5.1 COMPLAINTS AND CONCERNS PROCESS FOR STUDENTS

St Peter's College acknowledges that issues or concerns can cause stress or worry for students and impact their wellbeing and learning. St Peter's College encourages our students to raise issues or concerns as they arise so that we can work together to resolve them.

Students with a concern or complaint can raise them with a trusted adult at school, for example, with your Learning Advisor, subject teacher, House Leader, Pastoral Care Leader or Head of Campus. This person will take your concern or complaint seriously and will explain to you what steps we can take to try to resolve the issue and support you.

You can also ask to have another trusted adult present as a support person when discussing your concern or you can ask your parent, guardian, carer or another trusted adult outside of the school, to talk to us about the issue instead.

Other ways you can raise a concern or complaint with us include:

- talking to a member of student leadership (Forum or SRC) about your concern and any suggestions you have for resolving it
- Speaking with or emailing a member of the College counselling team
- participating in our student forums held in Pastoral lessons

5.2 COMPLAINTS AND CONCERNS PROCESS FOR PARENTS, GUARDIANS, CARERS AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Preparation for raising a concern or complaint.

St Peter's College encourages parents, guardians, carers or other members of the school community who may wish to submit a complaint to:

- carefully consider the issues you would like to discuss
- remember you may not have all the facts relating to the issues that you want to raise
- think about how the matter could be resolved
- be informed by checking the policies and guidelines set by DOSCEL and St Peter's College (see the "Related Policies and Procedures" section below).

Support person

You are welcome to have a support person to assist you in raising a complaint or concern with our school. Please advise us if you wish to have a support person to assist you, and provide their name, contact details, and their relationship to you.

Raising a concern

St Peter's College is always happy to discuss with parents, guardians, carers and community members any concerns that they may have. Concerns in the first instance should be directed to your child's teacher, Learning Advisor, House Leader or Deputy Principal. Where possible, school staff will work with you to ensure that your concerns are appropriately addressed.

Making a complaint

Where concerns cannot be resolved in this way, parents, guardians, carers or community members may wish to make a formal complaint to a member of the College's Leadership Team such as a Deputy Principal or the Principal.

If you would like to make a formal complaint, in most cases, depending on the nature of the complaint raised, our school will first seek to understand the issues and will then convene a resolution meeting with the aim of resolving the complaint together. The following process will apply:

- 1. Complaint received:** Please either email, telephone or arrange a meeting through the front office with the Deputy Principal or Principal, to outline your complaint so that we can fully understand what the issues are. We can discuss your complaint in a way that is convenient for you, whether in writing, in person, via video conference or over the phone.
- 2. Information gathering:** Depending on the issues raised in the complaint, the Principal, Deputy Principal or delegate may need to gather further information to properly understand the situation. This process may also involve speaking to others to obtain details about the situation or the concerns raised.
- 3. Response:** Where possible, a resolution meeting will be arranged with the Deputy Principal/Principal to discuss the complaint with the objective of reaching a resolution satisfactory to all parties. If after the resolution meeting we are unable to resolve the complaint together, we will work with you to produce a written summary of the complaint in the event you would like to take further action about it. In some circumstances, the Principal may determine that a resolution meeting would not be appropriate. In this situation, a response to the complaint will be provided in writing.
- 4. Timelines:** St Peter's College will acknowledge receipt of your complaint as soon as possible (usually within two school days) and will seek to resolve complaints in a timely manner. Depending on the complexity of the complaint, St Peter's College may need some time to gather enough information to fully understand the circumstances of your complaint. We will endeavour to complete any necessary information gathering and hold a resolution meeting where appropriate within 10 working days of the complaint being raised. In situations where further time is required, St Peter's College will consult with you and discuss any interim solutions to the dispute that can be put in place.

Please note that unreasonable complainant conduct (e.g., vexatious complaints) will be managed in accordance with the [DOSCEL COMPLAINTS AND GRIEVANCES MANAGEMENT POLICY](#)

Resolution

Where appropriate, St Peter's College may seek to resolve a complaint by:

- an apology or expression of regret
- a change of decision
- a change of policy, procedure or practice

- offering the opportunity for student counselling or other support
- other actions consistent with school values that are intended to support the student, parent, guardian, carer and school relationship, engagement, and participation in the school community.

In some circumstances, St Peter's College may also ask you to attend a meeting with an independent third party or participate in a mediation with an accredited mediator to assist in the resolution of the dispute.

Escalation

If you are not satisfied that your complaint has been resolved by the school, or if your complaint is about the principal and you do not want to raise it directly with them, then the complaint should be referred to the DOSCEL Secretariat.

St Peter's College may also refer a complaint to the DOSCEL Secretariat if we believe that it is unlikely that your complaint can be resolved via our complaint-handling process.

Record keeping and other requirements

To meet DOSCEL and legal requirements, St Peter's College must keep written records of:

- all complaints received, both written and verbal, and the actions taken to resolve them.
- Complaints relating to the Child Information Sharing Scheme (CISS) and Family Violence Information Sharing Scheme (FVISS) and Family Violence Multi-Agency Risk Assessment and Management Framework (MARAM), to meet regulatory requirements. Our school also follows DOSCEL policy to ensure that record-keeping, reporting, privacy and employment law obligations are met when responding to complaints or concerns.

- Discussed at staff briefings/meetings as required
- Included in our staff handbook/manual
- Discussed at parent information nights/sessions
- Available on the SPACE intranet pages for staff, students and parents
- Included in transition and enrolment packs
- Included as annual reference in school newsletter
- Discussed at student forums/through communication tools
- Made available in hard copy from school administration upon request.
